

HUMANITARIAN UPDATE TIMOR-LESTE

REPORTING PERIOD FROM 11 TO 24 OCTOBER

The Humanitarian Update (HU) aims at providing a periodic analysis of current humanitarian issues, facts and policy developments in Timor-Leste with primary attention given to internally displaced people (IDPs). The HU is based on voluntary information inputs from UN Agencies, Funds and Programmes, NGO members of the Humanitarian Coordination Committee and other partners. It analyses information from a variety of sector coordination meetings involving Timorese authorities. The HU is coordinated and issued by the OCHA/UNMIT Integrated Humanitarian Coordination Team (IHCT), on a fortnightly basis. WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

• <u>Metinaro, Motael, Farol and Belun IDP camps:</u> Plan held consultations with the camp management on WatSan issues which may arise in the future (particularly in light of the approaching wet season) and prepared plans to meet the identified needs.

CAMP DECOMMISSIONING

The Emergency Water and Sanitation and Hygiene Working Group (EWASH-WG) continues to decommission IDP camps as IDPs are facilitated to return by the Ministry of Social Solidarity (MSS). Decommissioning activities have been ongoing in the following camps:

- <u>Farol camps:</u> Plan organised a decommissioning meeting with the landlord to negotiate the future of all facilities on site.
- <u>Obrigado Barracks:</u> Following a decommissioning meeting with UNMIT, the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) and Site Liaison Support (SLS) agencies, it was decided that, since the Watsan facilities belong to UNMIT, they will remain in place.
- <u>Balide camps (Seminario and Sao Jose)</u>: Site rehabilitation was completed by Oxfam who will hand over the remaining facilities and the responsibility for their maintenance to the land owner. The remaining equipment includes: water tanks, water pumps and taps.

- Hera Port: Oxfam is continuing to clean the site.
- <u>Igreja Becora, Canosa Balide and Igreja Balide:</u> UNICEF and IOM have started to make arrangements for the decommissioning of WASH infrastructures in these sites and the mapping of WASH facilities, highlighting infrastructure to be removed. Activities under this decommissioning process include: joint site visits and information sharing with camp managers, camp landlords, DNSAS and other member of E-WASH working group.
- <u>Metinaro:</u> Plan prepared the field testing of water quality from tube wells and also began preparing for their 'Repair and Maintenance Training'.

SITE LIAISON SUPPORT (SLS) UPDATE

During the SLS meeting, it was proposed that for Baucau IDPs the verification and socialisation be carried out in stages, rather than handling all of the families at the same time. At the moment families are being told that all Baucau claims have to be verified (which will take place over perhaps three weeks) before socialisation can begin.

CHILD PROTECTION

- Plan identified and responded to four critical child protection incidents in their project in IDP camps. Two of these cases were referred by Child Protection Focal Points (CPFP) who recently completed Plan Child Protection training. All cases have been referred to the MSS Child Protection Office and PNTL Vulnerable Persons Unit, and responses are being coordinated between Plan, UNICEF, UNMIT HRTJS, and local service providers.
- Plan provided support to the MSS Child Protection Office in placing an abused child in safe accommodation and in following up with the child and parents.
- VPU gave a presentation at the last Child Protection Working Group meeting on correct reporting and case management procedures for child protection incidents.

IDP RELOCATION AND RESETTLEMENT PROCESS

UPDATE ON IDP MOVEMENTS

With the return of IDPs from Tasi-Tolu, Obrigado Barracks and Igreja Balide camps, more than 9000 IDP families will have received a recovery or reintegration package under the Hamutuk Hari'i Futuru National Recovery Strategy; 31 IDP camps have now closed according to MSS.

A breakdown of information relating to the latest IDP movements is as follows:

The return and reintegration of IDPs who wished to return home from Tasi-Tolu Transitional
 Shelter site occurred on 17 October, with a total of 106

- Movement out of Obrigado Barracks IDP camp occurred from 20 October to 25 October. A total of 408 families were assisted. The camp is now closed
- Movement out of Igreja Balide IDP camp occurred on 24 October. A total of 414 families were assisted. The camp is now closed.
- Movement out of the Canossa Balide camp is expected to commence on 29 October.

• The verification process is ongoing for Farol Primary School, Belun and Fokupers, Cathedral, Igreja Hosana, and the Baucau IDP camps.



TRANSITIONAL SHELTER UPDATE

A total of 93 rooms remain available in Transitional Shelter sites with a further 23 possibly available at Karantina if water trucking is increased.

Additional information about the Transitional Shelter sites is outlined below:

- <u>Tasi Tolu:</u> The Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) facilitated the movement of approximately 106 families out of Tasi Tolu on 17 October. There was one case of secondary occupation in Lemkari, and two case of conflict with the community of return (Manleuana and Tasi Tolu) which required mediation by MSS dialogue teams on the movement day. MSS staff distributed rice and conducted the dialogues. Care, Plan, The International Organization for Migration (IOM) and NRC accompanied the families home and conducted a rapid assessment of the state of the IDPs' living conditions. Trucks were supplied by MSS and IOM, and IOM assisted NRC with coordinating logistics.
- <u>Karantina:</u> The lack of water trucking to this site is still a concern; consequently there will be no available rooms until there is an increase in water trucking. On 20 and 21 October, 21 family representatives of IDPs from Bacau were accommodated in Karantina while they were in Dili for the verification of their damaged / destroyed houses with MSS. Additional water was trucked in by NRC during those two days to ensure access to water for all. Bacau IDPs visiting Dili for purposes of house verifications will be temporarily housed in Tasi Tolu in the future.
- <u>Becora UNITAL:</u> One family from Metinaro camp moved to Becora UNITAL. Eight rooms remain available.
- <u>Becora Market:</u> One family from Obrigado Barracks moved into Becora Market. Four rooms remain available.
- <u>Hera:</u> Following a request by MSS, NRC began the rehabilitation of one building and one block of latrines in Hera TS for the purpose of temporarily housing Baucau IDPs traveling to Dili for the verification of their houses. The rehabilitation was suspended however when a dispute arose concerning a former occupant claiming rights to the government building. MSS is currently reviewing the situation; rehabilitation can be completed in a day once the situation is resolved.

POST RETURN MONITORING

• IOM has released the first report of its Community-based Return Monitoring Project. The project aims to measure the effect on communities of recent large-scale return and reintegration of internally displaced persons (IDPs).

WATER, SANITATION AND HYGIENE

- <u>Tibar:</u> Discussions are ongoing with the MSS and the Ministry of Economy and Development to decide the future of the water and sanitation infrastructure at the site. Options available are to leave some on-site for the future bamboo factory, to destroy those not needed to secure the site or to remove part of them and reuse them in other sites targeting IDPs.
- <u>Becora Market, Becora UNITAL and Karantina:</u> Triangle GH used the International Day of hand-washing on October 15 to conduct monthly hygiene kits distribution in the transitional shelter sites. New families received full kits (soaps, washing powders, toilet brush, clothes brush, scoop, jerry cans) and the other families received refill kits (soaps, washing powder).

CHILD PROTECTION

• Plan conducted a full day workshop on child protection and listening to children with 36 Child Protection Focal Points (CPFP) from UIR, Motael, Becora UNITAL I&II, Qarantina, Tasi Tolu, Tibar

Ismaek. Despite movement out of Tasi Tolu and Tibar Ismaek, CPFP's remain active and continue to participate in Plan child protection training and in child protection activities in their return communities.

- Plan conducted a full day workshop on child rights, child protection and reporting abuse with 60 children from UIR, Motael, Becora UNITAL I&II, Qarantina, Tasi Tolu.
- Plan provided child protection support to NRC during IDP movement out of Tasi Tolu Transitional Shelter. Children expressed sadness at separating from friends, along with fear that their friends in the community would reject them, beat them and seek revenge against them. Plan distributed 250 IDP return packs, including children's games and material on child protection information / referral and health / hygiene, to returnee families.

EDUCATION

The Ministry of Education and UNICEF held a workshop on Minimum Standards for Education in Emergencies in Dili on 14 October. Staff from the Ministry of Education at national, regional and district level participated in the workshop in addition to UNESCO and key NGO partners working on Education in Emergencies, namely CARE, Christian Children's Fund (CCF), NRC and Plan International. The aim of the workshop was to familiarise the participants with the Minimum Standards and introduce the Education Cluster in line with the humanitarian reform. UNICEF continues to support the Ministry of Education in enhancing its capacity for emergency education by developing emergency preparedness and response plans at national, regional, district, and school levels.

HEALTH

On Friday 24 October, CPT (Centro Pupuh-ira Timor) organised a celebration in one of the communities, Ailelehun (an area witnessing high returns of IDPs), where the status of Open Defecation Free (ODF) was first reached.

HAMUTUK HARI'I KONFIANSA

• Strengthening Institutional Structures and Mechanisms for Dialogue Project

The six MSS/UNDP dialogue teams currently working across Dili have been supporting the final stages of return and reintegration of IDPs relocating from the Matadoro, Turleu and Ismaik camps in Tibar as well as supporting movement of IDPs from Obrigado Barracks camp

The two regional teams that are based in Baucau and Ermera are now functioning in their respective areas. Between the regional teams and the six teams based in Dili, eight proposals have been received in the last two weeks from communities seeking support to conduct dialogue meetings, these are currently being reviewed by the central MSS-based team

On 23 October in Baucau the MSS/UNDP team participated in the first regional Hamutuk Hari'i Konfiansa meeting, which has been established with support from UNDP, to strengthen coordination between the Government-led recovery process and the many partners and other actors involved in the trust-building activities in support of IDP return and reintegration. The meeting was chaired by MSS' region 1 coordinator with participants from Austcare, Ba Futuru, CRS, UNDP, UNHRTJS, UNPOL-CPU and WFP coming together to discuss programming and opportunities for future coordination.

• Support to the Trust-Building Pillar of the National Recovery Strategy Project

Ten proposals have now been selected for support under the small grants fund with half coming from International NGO's and half from National NGO's.

All of the projects selected address key activities as defined buy the Government in the Hamutuk Hari'i Konfiansa (Building Trust Together) section of the National Recovery Strategy Hamutuk Hari'i Futuru, likewise all of the proposals selected will seek to support the Government-led recovery process and the work of the MSS dialogue teams.

CRS and Austcare have now begun implementing their programs supported by the fund in Baucau, Viqueque and Lautem with CARE and Ba Futuru currently recruiting staff for their approved projects. Full proposal documents are currently under review for IOM, Caritas Australia, RCDS, ETCRN, the Liquica Justice and Peace Sub-Commission whilst RENETIL are drafting their full proposal.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

WATER AND SANITATION

- UNICEF followed up on the preparation of a Workshop intending to map the sector's capacity and provide tools to feed into its Emergency Preparedness Activities, as suggested by UNICEF Regional adviser last month. It was reminded that the workshop will be facilitated by UNICEF WASH regional adviser and a consultant and will be held from November 4 7 2008. The group started identifying different zones in Timor Leste in preparation of the future mapping exercise as well as the participants to the Workshop.
- As a follow up to the Jakarta training (between 22 and 25 September), the two participants from Plan and DNSAS are planning to organise an EWASH technical training in Dili in Bahasa Indonesia. The training will occur during the first week of December organized by Plan and DNSAS and funded by UNICEF and Plan.
- The UNICEF supported WASH sector capacity mapping was initiated last week; tools for data collection have been prepared and shared with DNSAS and the members of E-WASH working group. DNSAS, UN Agencies, NGOs and other relevant partners working in the area of WASH will be consulted to assess the sector capacity in responding to emergencies.

RAINY SEASON PREPAREDNESS

• Building on the efforts of 2007 rainy season preparedness, the water and sanitation working group, the SLS working group and the health sector are currently reviewing critical issues for remaining IDP camps during the rainy season. The working groups are reviewing the flood risk for the remaining camps and needs for drainage clearance inside and outside of IDP camps, securing and emptying septic tanks, shelter needs for tarpaulins, tent elevation, disease surveillance and referral mechanisms, anti-mosquito spraying of tents, and the delivery of health promotion messages. At the same time OCHA/UNMIT IHCT is also compiling an updated inventory of contingency stocks in country.

OF BROADER INTEREST

FOOD AID/SECURITY

- <u>School Feeding Programme:</u> The World Food Programme (WFP) has commenced food distribution in 13 schools (out of a total of 133) which amounts to 34.78 metric tones of rice, in Baucau. They have also distributed food to 13 schools in Ainaro out of 62 and three schools in Covalima out of 83 which amounts to 22.95 metric tonnes of rice, 5.2 metric tonnes of beans and 1.413 metric tonnes of oil.
- <u>Food Security:</u> WFP 'Food for Work' food aid monitors conducted interviews in Maucatar Sub District in Suai and discovered that local food products such as rice and greens are not available due to the heavy drought in October (expected in November also).
- Market Prices: The price of local rice (US \$ 0.8/kg) and many other items including rice (local), sugar, kidney beans, beef, and wheat flour) has remained stable but the price of imported rice has decreased (and is now US \$ 1/kg). The price of cassava has drastically increased (from US \$ 0.35/kg to US \$ 0.5/kg).
- Training for those conducting the food security assessment: (please refer to previous Humanitarian Updates for details) This was held at the WFP office in Dili from 21-22 October. This training involved National Disaster Management Directorate (NDMD) officials at District Level (Aileu, Ainaro, Baucau, Ermera, Lautem, Oecussi). The total number of participants was 15 (nine participants (six from the Districts and three from Dili) from NDMD; two from UNICEF; two from IOM and; two from WFP) with four facilitators. The topics for the training included: an introduction to the assessment; food security concepts; guidance in data field collection; review of the questionnaires to be used, field testing of the questionnaires and; logistics arrangements for the assessment.

SECURITY UPDATE

(Source: Joint NGO Security Office and UNMIT)

The overall security situation in Timor Leste has remained quiet and generally calm.

As part of the activities to celebrate UN Day, the PNTL and UNMIT Police assisted District Administrators with the destruction of weapons collected during the Government's national weapons collection campaign. Ceremonies were simultaneously conducted in Baucau, Aileau and Ermera (a ceremony to destroy ammunition was held at the F-FDTL firing range in Metinaro.

In addition to this, the following are of note:

8 - 15 OCTOBER

- There were 44 recorded incidents across Timor-Leste. This is lower than the last reporting period (40). UN Police (UNPol) made 36 arrests.
- Rumours of an impending Fretilin Peace March continue both in Dili and in the districts. The Fretilin senior leadership continues to state that the march will likely take place more towards the end of the year or, more likely, the beginning of next year.
- A PNTL officer's 6 year old child accidentally shot his infant brother on Saturday 11 October with his fathers' service pistol. The officer had brought his weapon home and placed it on the kitchen table where his son had picked it up.

15 - 22 OCTOBER

- There were 53 recorded incidents across Timor Leste. This is higher than the last reporting period (44). UN Police (UNPol) made 69 arrests.
- Preparations for the deployment of F-FDTL units to assist border policing continue.
- The F-FDTL unit which deployed to Oecussi earlier in the month in order to conduct training and patrolling left the enclave on the 18 October.
- A number of markets in Dili have been moved including the Mercado Lama market, the market near Lita store and vendors at Aspol and in Motael.


